Pammel Property at 3 Ridge Road Annexed

The Town Council has voted to annex approximately .42 acres at 3 Ridge Road and to classify this property as being within the Town's RR-1 zone (residential, one-family, minimum lot size 11,250 sq. ft.). A property tax credit will be issued to the owners for a period of five (5) years. On October 28, 1999, if no petition for referendum is received, the annexation will be effective after registration.

Planning Commission Work Session

Proposed Uses at Commercial Corner Tuesday, September 28, 1999 M^cCathran Hall Council Room, 7:30 p.m. The Commission has received a list of potential uses for the rental space at the Washington Grove Shopping Center from a representative of the owner. This work session will give Commission members an opportunity to examine and discuss each use in detail. Votes taken are consensus only and are not binding at subsequent meetings. The public is welcome as observers but may not participate unless called upon as resource persons. No formal action will be taken nor written report generated from this work session. The Commission has invited the Town Council to attend as participants. According to the State Open Meetings Law, the Commission may elect to hold part of the meeting in closed session. The public is invited to comment on this or any subject as part of the regular October 5 Planning Commission meeting. The meeting agenda will include a brief history of the commercial corner and the Town's zoning code and Master Plan regarding the commercial zone. Building Permits

If you are going to erect a building or structure (including fences), make structural alterations to, or move any existing building or other structure, you must first obtain a building permit from the Washington Grove Planning Commission. The Town zoning ordinance governs setbacks, lot coverage, and height. Applications are available at the Town Office at 301-926-2256. Please allow at least 10 days for review by the Commission. Call John M^cClelland at 301-963-3328 if you have questions about zoning code requirements. Interior renovations which involve electrical, plumbing, or load-bearing changes generally require a County permit. All applications for County-required building permits must first be signed off by the Town.

The Town has some special young citizens! Eight of the children who started out on The Acorn Trail, the summer reading program at Acorn Library, managed to do the reading and complete an oak tree chart.

For each book a reader finished he added one leaf to his tree. Most of the participants also earned acorns to add to their trees by doing certain activities. Katie Andrews, for instance, tried soap carving, enjoyed a nature hike and learned to identify a new tree. Dylan and Marie Hodges both earned acorns for star-gazing, taking a nature walk, and for writing or dictating comments on their favorite books.

By the end of the six weeks, every one of the readers had built such a healthy, leafy tree that it was necessary to award the potted oak seedling prizes to all eight!

The only person to complete the challenge in the "oak" age group (8 and older) was Violet Cavicchi. She read 18 books this summer including some wonderful ones like *Matilda*, *The Borrowers* and *Little House on the Prairie*.
