If you are going to erect a building or structure (including fences), make structural alterations to, or move any existing building or other structure, you must first obtain a building permit from the Washington Grove Planning Commission. The Town zoning ordinance governs setbacks, lot coverage and height. Applications are available at the Town Office at 301-926-2256. The permit fee is \$10.00, payable to the Town of Washington Grove. Interior renovations, which involve electrical, plumbing, or load-bearing changes, generally require a County permit. A shed requires a County permit as well. The Town must first sign off all applications for County-required building permits. The Historic Preservation Commission will review most permits as well.

The HPC is proposing to place a historic marker plaque near the entrance to the Town near the intersection of Grove Road and Brown Street in Morgan Park. The memorial would consist of a plaque stating some important events in the history of Washington Grove. The plaque would be made of bronze and would be affixed to a 4 ft. tall by 5 ft. wide by 3 ft. deep granite stone. The stone would weigh approximately 1.5 - 2 tons and would be supported by a deep bed of gravel. The HPC would appreciate any comments or suggestions positive or negative on this project. The current wording is as follows:

WASHINGTON GROVE

A TOWN WITHIN A FOREST

Founded in 1873 along a new branch of the B&O Railroad, the collection of tents and small cottages at its center flourished for many years as a private Methodist camp meeting association. Discovered by Chautauqua in the 1890s, the Grove became somewhat of an artists' colony, with plays and performances by residents and visiting lecturers. Its wide, shady avenues, ornamented with Victorian-era summer houses, were for promenading - wagons were kept to the narrow streets and alleys. The rise of the automobile, the decline of the camp meetings and revivals, and the sting of the Great Depression sounded the death knell of the camp meeting association, but its best traditions were reborn when the Grove became an incorporated municipality in 1937, the first and only Maryland town to be ruled by the Town Meeting form of government. In 1980, the Town was listed on the National Register of Historic Places for its unique design, architecture, and governance.

Leaves Are Falling...

New and long-time residents alike are reminded of the Town contract for the removal of leaves in bulk each autumn. US Lawns will make regular but unscheduled pickups of leaves raked or blown into windrows within six feet of any walkway or roadway, excluding Railroad Street, 2nd Ave., 3rd Ave., 4th Ave., 5th Ave., and Boundary Street. This service begins November 1 and ends January 1, 2008, or as soon thereafter as we agree that the work is complete. This is your opportunity to have leaves removed without the additional work and expense of bagging.

Weather frequently affects this process, as rain can restrict movement of large trucks on the avenues. Also, one or two spectacular fall weekends in November or early December usually see most of us raking at the same time. As the contractor will time pickups based on the availability of full truckloads for vacuuming, if you rake when most other people rake the windrows will probably disappear relatively quickly. Please place your windrows with an eye towards traffic visibility and flow, and don't include brush or limbs that foul the vacuum. Happy raking! It's the rite of autumn, particularly in a town graced by so many beautiful deciduous trees.

Speaking of Leaf Blowers & Heavy Equipment...

Please be kind to your neighbors by remembering that the Town has an ordinance prohibiting the use of power equipment (by residents or their contractors) outside before NOON on Sundays. Article I, Section 7: Operation of Power Mowers Etc... "It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a power mower, chain saw, or other power equipment on Sundays before the hour of 12:00 Noon, except that electrically powered tools may be operated within a building with doors and windows closed." Final Recyclable Yard Waste Pick Up

Per our contract with Montgomery County Sanitation and Recycling, November 29th was the last date for collection of your big brown bags, bundles, or containers of recyclable yard waste for this year. This service will resume in early March. Town Maintenance will continue to collect your reasonably-sized brush piles. Gypsy Moth Alert

The Grove has experienced more gypsy moth infestation this year, especially in the northwestern side of town where State spaying did not occur last spring. If you noticed signs of gypsy moths in your yard (usually characterized by the presence of moth droppings (frass) or tree defoliation) you should look for egg masses in your yard. New egg masses can be seen any time after August. They will typically be found in the same places where the caterpillars were found. Common egg mass locations are the undersides of decks, rails, tables and so forth, underneath the leaves of climbing vines or ground cover plants, behind signs, under roof overhangs, where siding of a building meets the foundation, and on the bark on the trunks of trees. Ten or more egg masses per oak tree on your property are cause for concern!

Egg mass control can be done now and/or in the spring. Photos of egg masses can be seen at the following site

http://www.mda.state.md.us/pdf/gypsy_moth_egg_masses.pdf Large numbers of egg masses are commonly found in wood piles and on man made objects in the yard. The firewood should be burned, and egg masses can be scraped off lower parts of the trees and house and off objects in the yard any time before early-mid April when they begin to hatch. However simply scraping the eggs on to the ground will not necessarily kill them, so they should be collected and disposed of in the trash, or buried.

We do not yet know if the Sate of Maryland will be spraying in Washington Grove next spring. You can help your own trees by hunting for and eradicating egg masses in your yard. Any reduction in egg mass will help protect our town as a whole whether or not spraying occurs. Playground Group Forming
