Actions at the April 10, 2023 Town Council Meeting

- Reappointed Georgette Cole to the Planning Commission for the five-year term June 1, 2023 – May 31, 2028.
 - Approved the proposed FY 2024 budget and tax rates for presentation and adoption at the annual Town Meeting May 13, 2023.
 - Introduced Ordinance 2023-03, "Adopting the Town Budget for the Fiscal Year July 1, 2024, Through June 30, 2023, and Levying an Ad Valorem Tax on All Assessable Property Within the Town of Washington Grove, Maryland."
 - Changed the name of the Border Property Acquisition Reserve to the Property Acquisition Reserve, upon approval at the Annual Town Meeting.
 - Unanimously voted that the 2023 Annual Town Meeting will be virtual attendance-only via Zoom, and that technology should be acquired to make possible a hybrid Annual Town Meeting in 2024 (i.e., both in-person and virtual attendees).
 - Awarded the Comprehensive Stormwater Management Plan contract to Soltesz (\$15,000).
 - Scheduled a May 8th Town Council meeting to consider adoption of an amended Resolution 2023-01, "Acknowledging Washington Grove's Racially Exclusionary Past."
 - Scheduled the first meeting of the new Town Council for Monday May 22nd.

Notice of Public Hearing on Budget Ordinance

After approval of the annual budget at our Annual Town Meeting, Maryland state law requires the Town Council to adopt the budget by ordinance.

The Mayor and Town Council will hold an electronic public hearing on Monday, May 22, 2023, at 7:30 pm (prior to the Town Council meeting) by Zoom to hear public comment on Ordinance 2022-03, "Adopting the Town Budget for the Fiscal Year July 1, 2023, Through June 30, 2024, and Levying an Ad Valorem Tax on All Assessable Property Within the Town of Washington Grove MD."

Job Opening: Town Maintenance Coordinator

The Town is seeking a Maintenance Coordinator to coordinate and monitor landscape and maintenance activities throughout town. This is a *part-time and paid position* for a resident of the Grove. The Maintenance Coordinator will be supervised by the mayor and will be responsible for overseeing activities of the Town's contractor for routine Landscape and Maintenance services (RJI Inc.) and aiding in monitoring other contractors engaged by the Town to provide repair and other project services. Duties also include routine surveys of town property to identify landscape and maintenance needs that may arise from time to time (e.g., sign posts needing attention, fallen limbs, etc.), receiving suggestions from residents and communicating with contractors to facilitate timely and satisfactory completion of work projects. Time commitment for this new position is "guesstimated" to be up to five hours per week. The deadline to submit a building permit application for approval by the Planning Commission and review by the Historic Preservation Commission is **the 2nd Wednesday of the month** prior to the PC meeting at which the permit will be reviewed (this will be in the following month). This timing ensures the HPC will be able to complete a formal review before the PC meeting as this review is required for the PC to approve the permit in a timely fashion. If you are considering any renovation or building project at your house, be sure to get a copy of the procedures to apply for a Town Building Permit which will help you through the Town's process.

Hazard Mitigation

Please share your views on Montgomery County's 2024 Hazard Mitigation Plan update and the greatest hazards facing our community -- take the online Community Natural Hazards Survey today! [You can access the survey here](#).

Natural hazards are naturally occurring environmental risks. Where natural hazards overlap the built environment, they have the potential to cause great harm to communities and their critical infrastructure. Hazard mitigation planning is the process of identifying the risks, vulnerabilities, and the capabilities of our community. We then develop mitigation strategies to reduce the loss of life and damage to property from these natural events.

Hazard Mitigation Plans are key to breaking the cycle of disasters and making our community more resilient. On average, [every \\$1 spent on mitigation saves \\$6 on future disaster losses](#). With that in mind, another key benefit of having a FEMA-Approved Hazard Mitigation Plan is that Montgomery County would qualify to apply for future mitigation grant funding to implement these strategies. Hazard Mitigation Plans must be updated every five years to maintain eligibility to apply for hazard mitigation funding.

In coordination with the County's [Climate Action Plan](#), the 2024 Hazard Mitigation Plan will

take a closer look at the role climate change plays in hazards affecting Montgomery County, as well as, coupling climate resiliency strategies with hazard mitigation strategies.

Doug Tallamy Talk: Homegrown National Park (HNP)

Wednesday, May 31, at 7:30 pm, [via Zoom](#).

Join us for a talk by the renowned Dr. Doug Tallamy about what Grovers can do to support a healthy ecosystem and why that's important. He has been briefed on the Grove's specific challenges, such as our invasive plants. He will describe an approach to conservation that empowers each of us to play a significant role in the future of the natural world. His talks are delightful and informative; you won't want to miss this one!

Our nation's parks, preserves, and remaining wildlands – no matter how grand in scale – are too small and separated from one another to sustain the native trees, plants, insects and animals on which our ecosystems depend. We can fix this problem by practicing conservation outside of wildlands, where we live, work, shop, and farm. Thus, the concept for [Homegrown National Park \(HNP\)](#): a national challenge to create diverse ecosystems in our yards, communities, and surrounding lands by reducing lawn, planting native, and removing invasives. The goal of HNP is to create a national movement to restore 20 million acres with natives, an area representing half of what is now in lawn. We are at a critical point where we are losing so many native plant and animal species that our natural life support is in jeopardy. However, if many people make small changes, we can restore healthy ecological networks and weather the changes ahead.

Doug Tallamy is a highly honored writer and long-time professor in the Department of Entomology and Wildlife Ecology at the University of Delaware. Chief among his research goals is to better understand the many ways insects interact with plants and how such interactions determine the diversity of animal communities. His books include *Bringing Nature Home*, *The Living Landscape*, co-authored with Rick Darke, *Nature's Best Hope*, a New York Times bestseller, and *The Nature of Oaks*, winner of the American Horticultural Society's 2022 book award. In 2021, he co-founded Homegrown National Park with Michelle Alfandari.

Edible Garden Update: What's Done and What's Ahead

In June 2022, the Grove agreed to a pilot project creating a new community garden to donate produce to a food bank. Montgomery County produces less than 5% of the food it consumes, and food insecurity is a serious problem; community gardens are a piece of the solution. In the

second half of 2022, we laid out the garden, worked to improve the soil, and donated our first harvests of sweet potato leaves and the potatoes themselves to Manna in Gaithersburg. This year we will learn what the improved soil can do!

On February 20, we received another truckload of nature's finest aged horse manure kindly donated and delivered by former Grover Jessica Jones. All the beds that had buckwheat cover crop plus the planned native plant flower garden received manure, topped with straw. Various supplies, including row covers, seeds, a hose, pruning snips, etc. were ordered for the garden at this time. In mid-March we planted Desiree potatoes surrounded by white onion sets.

On April 2nd, we picked up the pace and, after light weeding everywhere we planted: onion starts, kale, collards, chard, and mustard green plants, inter-planted with lettuce seeds and pea seeds in rows. All the beds are now planted with veggies except the two still growing the crimson clover cover crop. The green veggies are covered by row covers to keep the pesky bugs away. The clover provides a burst of color, then we'll turn it under to make way for the summer crops. The garlic is growing well; we'll harvest in June and plant hot weather crops.

The new native plant pollinator garden is filling in. At home, the summer season seedlings are growing indoors. The garden crew always welcomes new volunteers!

Earth Day Recap

Although the weather didn't cooperate for our planned outdoor events, many Grovers gathered for a truly delicious Earth Day Vegetarian Potluck. A short presentation about the inventory of the Town's greenhouse gas emissions was followed by the film "No Impact Man" and a wide-ranging discussion.

Woods Committee News

The Woods Committee is working on several long-term projects. We are cooperating with the Historic Preservation Commission in the restoration of Whetstone Spring in the West Woods. We hope to have this restoration completed in time for the Town's 150th Celebration weekend in August. The Town Council awarded a contract in April to Soltesz Engineering Company for an incremental design plan to manage storm water volume and velocity and mitigate storm water damage in the residential part of Town west of Grove Avenue and in the West Woods. The Woods Committee will work closely with the Soltesz team in this plan development.

There has been recent vandalism of trail signs that were pulled from posted sites in the West Woods and used against the Maple Lake fence to trespass and gain entrance to the unattended Lake area. These trail signs were erected to help people enjoy our forest preserves. If you have information about acts of vandalism or observe suspicious behavior, please contact Wood Committee co-chairs Joan Mahaffey or Patty Klein. Also, dumping plant debris, including wood chips, in the Forest Preserves and Conservation Meadow is not allowed.

Many thanks to new resident Stephen Shapanka and long-time resident Mike Voight for helping to protect holly and dogwood trees along the walking trails near Ridge Road. With help from volunteers such as these, we can restore the understory which has been threatened by deer over browsing during the last 30 years.

A spring walk in the woods is exhilarating. Spicebush, viburnum, and dogwood blooms splash the understory with color. Blueberry and small holly, oak, and hickory saplings dot the forest floor, along with a carpet of ephemerals, such as jack in the pulpit and trout lily. A native pink azalea is blooming at the intersection of the Cherry and Frankland Trails. A native mountain laurel will soon bloom near the intersection of the Frankland and Dogwood Trails. The Woods Committee will plant several new trees this month along the McCauley and Frankland Trails in the East Woods. Please stay on the walking trails to protect these reforestation areas. Enjoy this exuberant season in our forest preserves!
