Town Council Enacts Ordinance Adopting the Town Budget and Tax Rates for FY 2024

Maryland law requires municipal budgets to be adopted by ordinance. On May 22, the Town Council affirmed the action taken by the May 13th Town Meeting and enacted Ordinance 2023-02 adopting the budget and tax rates.

Elections Results

Annual Town elections were held Saturday, May 13, in advance of the Town Meeting. John Compton was elected to a one-year term as Mayor. Peter Nagrod and Rob Gilmore were elected to Town Council for three-year terms. Mary Warfield was elected to a two-year Council term, the completion of the late Darrell Anderson's final term. As always, deep gratitude to those willing to give of their time, energy, and talents in serving the Town in these capacities. Thanks as well to all who participated by voting.

Town Meeting Adopts FY 24 Budget and Tax Rates

The property tax rate for the fiscal year beginning July 1 will be the constant yield rate of \$0.2370 per each \$100 of assessed valuation. The dwelling unit charge, tied to the cost of trash and recycling collection, will be \$240.00 per dwelling per year. Copies of the adopted budget detail are posted on the Town website. Building Permit Submission Deadline

The deadline to submit a building permit application for approval by the Planning Commission and review by the Historic Preservation Commission is **the 2**nd **Wednesday of the month** prior to the PC meeting at which the permit will be reviewed (this will be in the following month). This timing ensures the HPC will be able to complete a formal review before the PC meeting as this review is required for the PC to approve the permit in a timely fashion. If you are considering any renovation or building project at your house, be sure to get a copy of the procedures to apply for a Town Building Permit which will help you through the Town's process.

Summer BBQ Pet Safety

If you bring your pet to a BBQ this summer, be mindful of the hazards and exercise caution as you celebrate.

 Poisonous foods: Alcohol, grapes, onions, chocolate, and anything containing Xylitol are toxic to pets.

- Choking and intestinal blockage: Corn cob, bone, peach pit, and skewers are common obstructions.
- **Limit fatty foods**: They can cause inflammation of the pancreas (pancreatitis), which can be deadly.
- **Dumpster diving dangers:** Unsecured trash can contain all of the hazards listed above.
- **Guard the grill:** The aroma of sizzling meat can lead to toppled grills and burned paws. For more information, watch this short video by Schwarzman Animal Medical Center: **BBQ** and picnic foods that are dangerous for pets

Hazard Mitigation

The Montgomery County <u>RainScapes Rewards Rebate Program</u> offers rebates up to \$7,500 to residential property owners who install RainScapes techniques such as rain gardens, rain barrels, conservation landscaping and other approved projects that help control stormwater.

The RainScapes Program is funded by the **County's Water Quality Protection Charge**.

Did You Know that You Can Get FREE TREES for Your Property?

Tree Montgomery is a FREE program to plant shade trees across Montgomery County, Maryland. Its goal is simple – to plant shade trees and increase our tree canopy, which will provide an array of benefits for you and for our community. Many of the large old trees that have died in Town in recent years were on private property. This is an opportunity to help replace them without cost to the homeowner. Tree Montgomery's trees are more than 10 feet tall when planted and will eventually grow to more than 50 feet tall, providing benefits for you and for Town. Stormwater Mitigation

The Woods Committee co-chairs and Mayor Compton met with our contractor, the environmental engineering company Soltesz, to review the scope of work for the stormwater mitigation project. Soltesz will survey existing stormwater infrastructure in public areas to develop an assessment for improvements. The Woods Committee will also be working with RJ Landscaping company on the restoration of Whetstone Spring in the West Woods. We hope to have this restoration completed in time for the Town's 150th Celebration weekend in August.

New Trees!

Fourteen new trees (oaks, dogwood, redbuds, service berry) were planted in the East Woods along McCauley, Frankland, and Cherry walking trails to replace lost trees and support the tree canopy. We are looking for volunteers, individuals, or families, who can "adopt" a new tree and water it once or twice a week, depending on rainfall. Several families have watered trees in the past: Challstrom, Quesada, O'Connell, Zwaniecki. We sincerely appreciate these volunteers. If you are willing to help, please contact Joan Mahaffey.

The kids living in these apartments have worked hard while overcoming challenges, so we also provide gifts for those graduating from kindergarten, elementary school, middle school, and high school. One of this year's graduates will be going on to Montgomery College!

The Need for Our Outreach

On May 5, 2023, the <u>Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments</u> announced the results of the 2023 Point in Time (PIT) count of people experiencing homelessness. After consecutive years of declining PIT counts, the results show an overall increase in EVERY jurisdiction.

Montgomery County's survey counted 894 adults and children experiencing homelessness and residing in shelters, transitional housing, or who were unsheltered. This includes 611 adult-only households and 85 families with children.

We can't end the poverty and homelessness around us, but our Town, through your generous contributions and donations, goes a long way towards making life a little easier for these people.

Clothing Partnership with Emory Grove United Methodist Church

We're getting a great response to our partnership with the Emory Grove Church to collect used clothing, in good condition, to give to people in the community on the third weekend of each month. Drop off your donations at the Clubhouse porch or on Wendy Weisbard's porch at 119 Grove Avenue. The Church will pick up and distribute clothes.

Helping Families in the Archways Program

We now support seven families through Archways, a program for families who are chronically homeless. They are always in need of non-SNAP necessities, like towels, wash clothes, cleaning supplies, feminine hygiene products and deodorant. Other non-SNAP items that are always needed are diaper wipes, hand sanitizers, laundry detergent, paper towels, any flavor of Pedialyte, blue box Similac powder and toilet paper. With the recent major cuts to the SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program) allowances, our monthly boxes of non-SNAP items mean that families don't have to stretch their budgets to buy those needed supplies

The 17 children in this program range in age from infants to teenagers. We frequently give their social worker treats to take to the children when she visits, in addition to the care packages we have prepared for the families from your generous donations. With summer coming and the kids out of school, they may not be able to take advantage of the school meal programs, so donations of breakfast foods, mid-day snacks and non-perishable lunch foods are especially needed.

Drop off your donations at the Clubhouse or on the porch at 119 Grove Road. Checks should be made out-to the Woman's Club (WCWG), and in the memo line, indicate if you want the money to go towards a specific project, like non-SNAP, or leave the memo line blank and let us determine which program is most in need at the time. Other Notices Dumping Prohibited!

The Mayor and Council remind residents that dumping (grass, leaves, brush, chips, debris etc.) on Town parkland or in the Conservation Meadow is not permitted. Areas of the Woods boundaries, Morgan Park along Brown Street, and elsewhere have intentionally been left to "over-grow" to restore native flora or provide a natural sound barrier. **Town property should not be used as a dumping area for residents or their lawn service contractors.** In rare situations, and only upon application to the mayor, specific and explicit permission may be granted.

Chestnut Avenue Urgent/Emergency Sewer Replacement

The sewer line running under Chestnut Avenue between Brown Street to beyond Oak Street (102 Chestnut to 202 Chestnut) is being replaced by contractors for WSSC (Ross Contracting). A note from them:

Thank you for your continued patience while WSSC Water investigated the six-inch sewer main on Chestnut Avenue. We understand the inconvenience and we appreciate the community's patience while we investigated this project.

Background Information

As a result of a recent CCTV inspection of the six-inch diameter sewer main on the 100 and 200 block of Chestnut Avenue, WSSC Water will need to replace two sewer segments. The rehabilitation will include upsizing the current six-inch to an eight-inch pipe as well as replacing three manholes along Chestnut Avenue. The current pipe was installed in 1926 which makes it necessary to rehabilitate to ensure we continue to provide safe and reliable service.

Project Update

- **Pipe Replacement:** Sewer service laterals will be replaced between the 100 and 200 block of Chestnut Avenue.
- **Pipe Bursting:** The six-inch pipe will be upsized to the eight-inch pipe via trenchless pipe bursting.
- **Sewer Manhole Rehabilitation:** The affiliated three manholes along Chestnut Avenue will be replaced.
- o **Restoration:** Restoration is expected to be completed by the end of Summer 2023.

Anticipated work hours: **Monday - Friday, 7:00 am - 4:00 pm.** Work will occasionally extend beyond these hours to complete specific tasks.
