The deadline to submit a building permit application for approval by the Planning Commission and review by the Historic Preservation Commission is **the 2<sup>nd</sup> Wednesday of the month** prior to the PC meeting at which the permit will be reviewed (this will be in the following month). This timing ensures the HPC will be able to complete a formal review before the PC meeting as this review is required for the PC to approve the permit in a timely fashion. ### **Washington Grove Earns Sustainable Maryland Bronze Certification**

**BIG NEWS!** Washington Grove has earned the bronze-level certification from *Sustainable Maryland!*

Monica Maher and Bruce Daggy of the Sustainability Committee's Green Team accepted the certification award for Washington Grove at the Maryland Municipal League conference in College Park on October 16. Bob Booher participated in discussions at the event about measuring and lowering community carbon footprints.

Since 2021, the Town has worked diligently to act on our commitment to sustainability in its broadest sense and to document actions for the certifiers. We are making progress towards:

- the elimination of fossil fuels and the implementation of renewable energy throughout Town;
- the use of heat pumps, electric vehicles, and energy-efficient appliances;
- a community-based food system; social equity; and
- other goals.

As a certified member of *Sustainable Maryland*, the Town has joined forces with the Sustainable States Network, which currently comprises 14 states (including populous California, New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and Florida) and their 65 million residents. Our membership gives us access to a strong peer network, expert advice, and training to help us achieve our sustainability ambitions. More about the benefits of our membership will appear in a future Bulletin.

Many volunteers on Grove committees and commissions helped the Green Team, which was led by Ernie Kawasaki, reach this substantial goal. We congratulate and thank everyone involved, including the Mayor and Council members who have strongly supported this effort from its beginning.

## **Frequently Asked Questions about the Grove’s New Cash Incentive Program for Heat Pumps and Electric Vehicles**

**Q1: Where can I find details about the incentives program?**

A1: [You can read about the program here.](#)

**Q2: How do I get an application form?**

A2: Pick it up at the Town Office or [download and print it here.](#)

**Q3: Who can help me apply?**

A3: Paul Patrone or Bob Booher can help you complete your application. (Contact information is in the Town Directory.)

**Q4: How much cash can I get?**

A4: Cash incentives are \$1,000 or \$1,500. See details [on the web page about the program.](#)

**Q5: I just installed a heat pump/bought an electric vehicle. Can I apply for a cash incentive?**

A5: Purchases completed on or after July 1, 2023 qualify for the cash incentive under certain conditions, such as relying on community solar energy (or the equivalent) for your home electricity.

**Q6: I think I should get a heat pump but have no idea how to get started. What should I do?**

A6: Learn about heat pumps [on the web page “Switching Your Home Heating From Radiators To Heat Pumps – 13 Q & A’s”](#). In particular, read item 9, “How do I get started in making the change to a heat pump?” Getting a home energy audit is an important early step.

**Q7: I’m interested in buying an electric vehicle but need to learn more before I get serious. Where can I find information about these vehicles?**

**Q8: How much will the Town spend on the incentives program?**

A8: The Town budgeted \$20,000 for the incentives program. If all funds are spent, applications will be held in the hope that the next town budget will replenish the money for this effort.

### **Please think about the Kids Without Coats and the Homeless Men Without Socks During the Coming Long and Frigid Winter!**

The winter cold is brutal when you don't have a coat, hat, scarf or other outerwear, and far too many of our local children could be going to school without them. The Woman's Club does what it can to fill this critical need by collecting gently used or new children's coats and outerwear. In

the past, our Town's generosity has helped keep the kids at Washington Grove Elementary School warm.

Now that a new men's shelter has opened near us, we are again collecting new white socks for them! If you ask a homeless person if they have a choice between food or socks, they will always choose socks because they might be able to find food other places, but winter without socks is unbearable.

### **Clothing Partnership with Emory Grove United Methodist**

We continue to have a great response to our partnership with Emory Grove Church to collect used clothing, in good condition, to give to people in the community on the third weekend of each month. The church will pick up and distribute clothes. Because of their limited storage space, please try to donate seasonal clothing, so, winter clothing at this time of year.

### **The Needs are Great**

With the increasing number of people becoming homeless every day and the money for SNAP (food stamps) severely cut, the need to help them is also growing at a frightening rate. We can't end the poverty and homelessness around us, but our Town, through your generous contributions and donations, goes a long way towards making life a little easier for these people, especially the children.

The Woman's Club maintains a storehouse of your donations, which we use every month to put together boxes for each of the seven Archways families we support. While we can't feed them every day, we can make sure they have some occasional treats. We collect fruit cups, individually wrapped bags of cookies, crackers, and other snacks. Imagine what you enjoy snacking on and donate these for the kids in the Archway program! Also always needed are pasta, pasta sauce, peanut butter and grape jelly.

In addition to food, there's a critical need for non-SNAP necessities! Each month we're going to highlight the most critical non-snap needs, although many of the items are needed. This month we are again emphasizing the need for toilet paper, all-purpose cleaners or kitchen wipes, shower gel, clothing detergent, liquid dish detergent and paper towels.

### Bulk Leaf Collection Began October 31, 2023

New and long-time residents alike are reminded of the Town contract for bulk leaf removal each autumn. The contractor, Green Earth, Inc., will make regular but unscheduled pickups of leaves raked or blown into windrows within six feet of any roadway or walkway, excluding Railroad Street, 2nd Ave., 3rd Ave., 4th Ave., 5th Ave., and Boundary Street. This service begins October 31, 2023 and ends January 5, 2024, or as soon thereafter as we agree the work is complete. This is the only time to have leaves removed without bagging for recycling.

The contractor will time pickups based on the availability of full truckloads for vacuuming. One or two spectacular fall weekends in November or early December usually have most of us raking at the same time. If you rake when most others are raking, the windrows will probably disappear relatively quickly.

Please place your windrows within six feet of the road or walkway (keeping in mind car and pedestrian traffic).

Green Earth will collect leaves by working from one end of the Town to the other, typically starting with Ridge Road working their way across the community, first removing piles along roads for safety reasons. After making one pass along roads, they will focus on walkways. If roads become obstructed before walkways are completed, roads will be cleared until they are safe. Then collection will resume along walkways. Weather may affect this process. Rain can restrict movement of large trucks on the avenues and accumulated snow, or freezing rain may make piles too heavy to vacuum. **The contractor will not remove leaf piles that contain branches, brush, pruned limbs, and cut ornamental grasses. Please do not add these to leaf piles. They foul the vacuum and Green Earth will not collect piles containing this material.** If a particular leaf pile has lingered for an inordinate amount of time, please call Kathy Lehman at the Town Office, 301-926-2256, or by e-mail [washgrove@comcast.net](mailto:washgrove@comcast.net).

## **Bulk Trash Collection**

The Town has scheduled a bulk trash collection for November 4, 2023. Materials may include furniture, appliances (nothing with freon like air conditioning units), rugs, large toys, small auto parts, etc. Material may NOT include construction by-products from your renovation projects, large automotive parts, or tires. Items should not contain gasoline or motor oil. Please keep your metal separate from the rest of your trash.

## **Peopling of the Americas and Native American Presence in Montgomery County: A 12,000+ Year Story**

On Saturday, November 11, 2023, 3 pm, McCathran Hall, Don Housley, president of the Mid-Potomac Chapter of the Archeological Society of Maryland will give a Power Point presentation covering briefly the theories concerning the peopling of the Americas before turning to a discussion of the three major archaeological time periods (Paleo, Archaic, and Woodland) associated with the pre-Contact (before European settlement) history of Native Americans in the Mid-Atlantic. Discover the environment, social structure, and tool development of the three time periods in Montgomery County and Washington Grove including a discussion of the Washington Grove Steatite Quarry site and other possible pre-Contact sites in the area. Some of those actual artifacts will be on display. Attendees are invited to bring any potential pre-Contact artifacts they have collected on their property or elsewhere in Washington Grove.

### **Bring local artifacts if you have them.**

Don Housley retired in July 2005, after 36 years teaching U.S. history and serving the last 25 years of his teaching career as chairman of the Social Studies Department at Wheaton High School in Montgomery County, Maryland. Currently, he volunteers in the Office of Archaeology for Maryland-National Capital Park and Planning Commission (Montgomery County). Mr. Housley also serves as president of the Mid-Potomac Chapter of the Archeological Society of Maryland and from 2016 to 2020 served as president of the Archeological Society of Maryland. He is member of Montgomery History and its Speakers' Bureau, and for many years helped teach Life-Long Learning archaeology courses at Montgomery College-Rockville campus.
