An Analysis of the Viewshed of the Town of Washington Grove

As part of its work in preparing the Town's updated National Register nomination, Robinson & Associates produced viewshed documentation for Washington Grove, complete with photographs and maps. Here's their introduction – followed by a link to the complete document.

The purpose of this viewshed documentation is to identify and record the historic properties and landscapes that comprise the broader setting of the Washington Grove Historic District and contribute to its visual character and historic context. The National Register of Historic Places defines setting as the physical environment of a historic property that illustrates the character of the place. Setting often reflects the basic physical conditions under which a resource was built or developed and the functions it was intended to serve. The physical features that constitute the setting of a historic resource can be either natural or manmade, including such elements as topographic features, vegetation, buildings, structures, or open space. The integrity of a historic district's setting can be retained if there are visual buffers that block or screen intrusions into viewsheds, such as modern or incompatible development. This analysis does not address the internal setting of the historic district, which is also crucial to its historic integrity. With the goal of documenting baseline conditions to help protect the historic district and preserve its broader setting, ... please find:

- a) photographs of each property/landscape that comprise the historic setting of the historic district,*
- b) a map detail showing each of the viewshed areas and the sightlines between the photographer and the subject of the photographs, and*
- c) a short narrative describing the property/landscape and the significance of its relationship to the historic district.*

This timing ensures the HPC will be able to complete a formal review before the PC meeting as this review is required for the PC to approve the permit in a timely fashion. If you are considering any renovation or building project at your house, be sure to get a copy of the procedures to apply for a Town Building Permit which will help you through the Town's process.

We meet the fourth Wednesday of every month. All are welcome to attend!

The Lighting Committee is working with other Maryland Municipalities to allow the option of municipal streetlight ownership.

Our streetlights are currently owned by Pepco.

If the Town owned its street lights, we would not be in repeated danger of Pepco trying to pass a tariff that would allow them to replace all our street lights with some ugly options and then charge us a lot for them in perpetuity.

Owning our own street lights will allow us to maintain the savings that we have gotten from two conversions of our street lights from an annual cost of approximately \$20,000 to \$5,000. It will give us the opportunity to control the aesthetics and functionality of our street lights and walkways. Additionally, if we owned our lights, we would be eligible for [grants like SOLE from the State of Maryland](#).

We are close to a deal that will make municipal street light ownership in Maryland a cost-effective reality!



Minimizing Exposure to Micro- and Nano-plastics

What's found in the air you breathe, the water you drink, the food you eat, inside your brain, and even in a newborn baby's first poop? If you answered plastic, you would be correct. Recent studies have found micro- and even smaller nano-plastic particles virtually everywhere in the environment.

Some results have surprised scientists. Bottled water was found to contain not only PET (the plastic used to make the bottle), but greater amounts of polyamides (from the nylon filters used to purify the water by reverse osmosis), plus polystyrene, polyvinyl chloride, polymethyl methacrylate (AKA plexiglass), and a host of other plastics of unknown origin and chemistry. Many were small enough to cross the blood-brain barrier and carry other molecules along with them. The health effects in humans are unknown, but animal studies have raised multiple concerns. Therefore, it could be prudent to avoid unnecessary exposure, especially in children.



It's impossible to avoid exposure, but here are some ways to minimize it:

- Whenever possible, use glass or stainless-steel containers for beverages and food storage.
- Never microwave food in plastic.
- Do not wash plastic containers in the dishwasher.
- Limit your consumption of canned foods – the can lining is likely made of plastic.
- Reduce your consumption of processed foods. *Consumer Reports* recently detected phthalates in 84 of 85 processed foods tested, and most also contained bisphenols. But you may want your table salt to be *more* processed; sea salt can be high in plastic contamination.
- Choose clothing made from natural materials.
- Vacuum floors using a HEPA filter.

You can also take steps to minimize the single-use plastic that you add to the environment by adjusting your daily purchase decisions.

Our April meeting will be on Monday, April 1. All are invited to attend. We welcome new members who want to protect our two Forest Preserves, the East and West Woods.

We have been working with the Mayor and Town Council to prepare a “Design to Build” Request for Proposals for Stormwater Management in the residential part of Town west of Grove Avenue. Hopefully this upstream work will help control some of the runoff into the West Woods. Major West Woods drainage issues will have to be addressed later.

The Woods Committee is working to complete posting of trail signs in both the East and West Woods and to prepare a digital map of the East Woods trails. When finished, this map will be posted on the Woods Committee page of the Town website.

This time of year, the Woods can be very wet, and the weather can be very windy. Please use caution when entering the Woods, especially on windy days. A reminder to please stay on the walking trails to protect understory native plant vegetation. Do not walk or bike on trails that are too wet and muddy to avoid rutting and soil erosion. We hope these precautions allow you to experience our Woods Preserves in a safer and more enjoyable way. If you discover trees blocking trails, please contact Joan Mahaffey or Patty Klein, Woods Committee Co-chairs.

As we make progress on control of non-native invasive plants and deer over browsing, we anticipate the emergence of more native ephemerals, shrubs, and saplings, especially in the East Woods. The spring explosion changes from day to day. For help in identifying your discoveries, websites such as the [Chesapeake Bay Native Plant Center](#) provide descriptions and photographs of native grasses and ground covers, shrubs, and trees. Search within the Piedmont Region for optimal results. Stay healthy and stay happy!

The Woods Committee will be discussing several projects for the coming year:

- Continue trail maintenance and signage to increase residents’ and neighbors’ enjoyment of the Forest Preserves and to protect newly sprouting trees and understory;
- Develop digital maps of trails in the East and West Woods.

- Improve stormwater drainage in the residential part of Town which drains into the West Woods.
- Continue reforestation projects.
- Finalize the Woods Committee budget for Fiscal Year 2024/25.
- Other projects which may arise from discussion.

If you are interested in working on any of these projects, please contact either Joan Mahaffey or Patty Klein (Woods Committee co-chairs) or join us at our February 5 meeting. New Woods Committee members and new ideas are always welcome.

Our volunteer Bow Hunter Fire Fighters of Maryland harvested nine deer during this archery season which began in September 2023 and ended on January 31, 2024. Please contact Joan Mahaffey or Pat Klein if you have any questions.

We hope you had an opportunity to enjoy the seasonal beauty of our pristine, snow-laden East and West Woods during January.
