Actions at the March 11, 2024 Town Council Meeting

- Held a Closed Session for legal consultation with the Town Attorney concerning neglected maintenance of private properties.
 - Rejected a recommendation from the Racial and Social Equity Committee to change the name of McCathran Hall.
 - Awarded the contract for FY24 Auditing Services, renewable thru FY28, to Lindsey and Associates.
 - Awarded to Casella contracts for FY25 Refuse and Recycling collection, renewable through FY27.
 - Approved the **[Policy on Town Tree Management](#)** (for residents).
 - Amended Ordinance 2023-08 enabling Accessory Dwelling Units and deferred action until March 25th to provide for further resident comment.
 - Rescheduled the April Town Council meeting from the 8th to the 16th.

Actions at the March 25, 2024 Town Council Meeting

- Approved the Mayor's appointment of William Earl to the HPC to fill out the three-year term FY24-FY26
- Adopted *Ordinance 2023-08, Amending the Washington Grove Zoning Ordinance to Expand Housing Opportunities and Update Vehicle Parking Requirements.*

Mayor's Kudos

To *Christine Dibble*, our volunteer super webmaster, in addition to the time she spent modifying webpages to keep up with developments in Town, promptly posted the flood of recent correspondence to the Mayor and Town Council for residents to access.

Stump Carving Suggestion Gets Overwhelming Town Council Approval

The resident-initiated proposal has been gaining momentum to have the tree stump on the Oak Street walkway in Woodward Park carved into a Grove-appropriate public work of art. Resident ideas for the artwork have been solicited, and stump-carver Colin Vale has been consulted. He puts the expense in the \$5K-\$10K range, depending on the final design. Resident donations will be sought to partially support the project, with the draft FY25 Town Budget proposing the Town match funds (up to \$5K), which will raise the total of \$5K-\$10K required for the project.

While carefully considering the artwork ideas for carving the stump, the mayor intimated he may make a substantial donation to the project. The Town Council unanimously agreed to feature Mayor Compton's likeness on the stump. (Please note the date of this Town Bulletin.)

Annual Town Elections and Town Meeting News

Election Day is Saturday, May 11. Nominations close April 8. In person voting is at the Hall between 4-7 PM, followed by the annual Town Meeting beginning at 8:00. Eligible residents have the option to cast votes through the same absentee procedure as the last several years, with ballots available after the close of nominations. **All details, as well as a ballot request form, will be available on the Town website.** Eligible voters are those registered to vote in Montgomery County at a Town address.

Maryland State Income Tax

Washington Grove Subdivision Code: 1612

Every year the Town of Washington Grove receives a portion of the Maryland State income tax paid by Town residents. Because most residents do not have mail delivered to street addresses, this presents a challenge for the State Comptroller's office when attributing the taxes collected to Washington Grove. It is **critical** that **all** Washington Grove residents (including renters) designate "**1612**" and "**Washington Grove**" on the tax form. For those filing electronically or using software, there should be a drop-down menu to select Washington Grove. Please share this information with your renters and your tax preparer if appropriate. This **DOES NOT** increase your taxes but **DOES** help ensure the Town receives its proper share of income tax revenue. Thanks for your help! Questions, call Treasurer Jean Moyer at 301-775-1168.

Building Permit Submission Deadline

The deadline to submit a building permit application for approval by the Planning Commission and review by the Historic Preservation Commission is **the 2nd Wednesday of the month** prior to the PC meeting at which the permit will be reviewed (this will be in the following month). This timing ensures the HPC will be able to complete a formal review before the PC meeting as this review is required for the PC to approve the permit in a timely fashion. If you are considering any renovation or building project at your house, be sure to get a copy of the procedures to apply for a Town Building Permit which will help you through the Town's process.

The Forestry and Beautification Committee will meet on Wednesday April 10 when we will continue discussing the spring tree planting. Twelve new tree sites have been chosen and staked. We will be buying the trees between the end of March and up to mid-April. We keep a list of resident requests for town trees. If you have a suggestion for where a new decorative tree/s, or

You can also enjoy beautiful native trees in your own yard! Here are some tips from F&B member Jay Everhart.

Trees for Your Property

The Forest and Beautification Committee has the pleasant responsibility of planting trees on town land in the residential section of Washington Grove. The majority are shade trees to replace those that have died in recent years, some of which were over 200 years old. Many other trees that have been lost were on private land. While the Committee cannot plant trees on your land, homeowners can plant trees on their properties for either free or at discounted prices through state and county programs.

The best deal is through Tree Montgomery, which provides free shade trees for residences across the county. They will even plant the trees, the large majority of which are native to our area. The catch is that there is a waiting list for trees, currently at least a year. However, it is easy to [apply to get on the waiting list](#).

Marylanders Plant Trees provides a [\\$25 off coupon](#) on native trees at several area nurseries, including Stadler, Grey Goose, Potomac Garden Center, Country Nursery, and Sun Nurseries (Howard County).

Reforest Montgomery provides a [\\$50 off coupon](#) towards the purchase of a native tree at participating nurseries within the county: Stadler, Grey Goose, Potomac Garden Center, Country Nursery, Seasons Nursery, and Johnson's Florist and Garden Center.

These two coupons can be combined to get \$75 off the purchase price of a tree.

If you are interested but feel a little overwhelmed in choosing trees, please know that the Forestry and Beautification Committee is ready to help. The Lighting Committee is working with other Maryland municipalities to allow the option of municipal streetlight ownership. Our streetlights are currently owned by Pepco. If the Town owned its streetlights we would not be in repeated danger of Pepco trying to pass a tariff that would allow them to replace all our streetlights with some ugly options and then charge us a lot for them in perpetuity. If we owned our own streetlights, it will allow us to maintain the savings that we have gotten from two conversions of our streetlights from an annual cost of approximately \$20,000 to \$50,000. It will give us the opportunity to control the aesthetics and functionality of our streetlights and walkways. Additionally, if we owned our lights, we would be eligible for [grants like SOLE from the State of Maryland](#). We are close to a deal that will make municipal streetlight ownership in Maryland a cost-effective reality!

Two Special Events to Celebrate Earth Day (a few days late) on Sunday, April 28

Native Plant Talk

On Sunday, April 28 at 3:00 pm in McCathran Hall, Janet Hostetler will be giving a talk entitled **“Using locally native plants to solve common landscape challenges in Washington Grove.”** Janet describes herself as “a certified Maryland Master Gardener and recovering lawyer who is passionate about locally native plants.” Her business, [Bloom Wild](#) (and on Instagram @Bloom.wild.now), serves Maryland and the DC region with native plant consultations, designs, and gardening. Janet also grows and studies over 250 locally native plant species at her [test garden](#). She lives in Takoma Park and is familiar with the Grove.

Some of what she will cover:

- An introduction into ecological benefits of planting locally native plants, basic definitions, and how racial justice is a relevant context to understand.
- Gardening with deer -- a description of the types of plants that are less palatable to deer as well as some specific species that have worked for Janet and her clients.
- Replacing invasive bushes with Maryland native shrubs and hedges for moist shade.
- Resources, including a review of some local sellers and upcoming plant sales where these plants can be found.

Following her talk, Janet will be available to answer questions.

- **Reduce long-distance transfer of products.** Support nearby producers and lower emissions by reducing the distance produce has to move to reach you.
- **Cut out storage of products.** Enjoy fresh food and get the most out of the nutrients.
- **Eliminate unnecessary packaging.** Bring your own paper or fabric bags and avoid single-use bags and packaging.
- **Buy in quantities just right for you and your family.** Purchase loose fruits and vegetables in the appropriate numbers to cut down on unused food. Use what you buy!

Woods, especially on windy days. If you discover fallen trees blocking trails, contact Joan Mahaffey or Patty Klein, Woods Committee Co-chairs. Please do NOT try to remove or cut back fallen trees on your own without first contacting the Mayor or Woods Committee co-chairs. Your safety comes first!

As spring approaches, young people tend to congregate in the woods after school. A dog walker recently encountered two boys setting a campfire in the East Woods. In previous years we have discovered fire rings and camp sites in the East and West Woods. If you observe suspicious behavior, please contact Joan or Patty anytime, or call the Town Office weekdays. Outreach Programs

Each spring we hold our annual *Liz Robertson Memorial Underwear for Children Drive*, when we collect underwear for the less fortunate children around us. Far too many children have to go to school without underwear, so



we try to help by collecting new underwear to go into the back-to-school backpacks put together by Interfaith Works.

We need toddlers to teens, boys and girls. We keep a detailed list of what we've collected and what we still need, and we've developed sources to get them for reasonable prices.
