Election Day is Saturday, May 11. Nominations closed April 8. In-person voting is at the Hall from 4-7 pm, followed by the annual Town Meeting, which begins at 8 pm and is online.

Annual Town Meeting and FY25 Town Budget

The 88th Annual Town Meeting will be held virtually by Zoom Saturday, May 11, 2024, and will start at 8:00 pm. The meeting includes a vote to adopt the Fy25 Town Budget and Tax Rates. ***A quorum of 50 registered Town voters present is required for voting.*** For voting purposes, you may be asked to identify yourself.

Proposed Tax Rates

The Council has recommended a small (2%) decrease in the *Real Property Tax rate* from \$0.237/\$100 assessed valuation to the constant-yield rate of \$0.2326. The constant yield tax rate represents the real property tax rate for FY25 that is expected to generate the same amount of revenue as generated during FY24.

The *Dwelling Unit Tax*, which recovers the cost of trash and recycling collection from property owners, is proposed at \$173 per dwelling for FY25, a significant decrease from FY24. By way of explanation, our actual contract expenses for the current year will come in well below the expenses anticipated when the FY24 Dwelling Unit tax was calculated (\$201 versus the \$240 per dwelling unit assessed). Thus, property owners were overcharged \$39 last year. This amount is being credited, reducing the nominal \$212 charge for FY25 to \$173 per dwelling unit.

ad hoc Meadows Committee News

Next meeting: Wednesday, May 15, 2024

On April 5th the committee met in the Conservation Park with Ryan Colliton, Principal Natural Resources Specialist and Vegetation Ecologist with Montgomery Parks. Mr. Colliton supervises the ongoing meadow restoration projects at four other MoCo meadows. Although we raised concerns about the lower meadow, the focus was on the upper meadow where Washington Grove has more say in what happens. Mr. Colliton expressed concern about investing effort in the lower meadow given the possibility that a road will be built across it. He also noted that the survey work done for the road determined that the lower meadow is not truly a serpentine meadow, because the rock layer is too deep. This, from an ecological uniqueness perspective, makes it seem less of an asset to Parks.

Agreed action from this meeting include the following:

- Survey to identify select non-native invasive species for control (Parks, Volunteers). Parks will try to locate a Weed Warrior supervisor to aid eradication efforts. Heavy chemical treatment like what is being done at Rachel Carson Park is not seen as necessary here.
- Identify red cedars for reduction (Parks). Note: The trees at the edge of the meadow that partially block the view of houses in the Piedmont Crossing community will not be removed, in compliance with the need to protect that viewshed as a feature of Washington Grove's historic appearance.

- Identify goals for meadow to determine species to add, e.g. milkweed for monarchs (Volunteers).
- Coordinate plants and planting for increasing native biological diversity, est. Fall '24, Spring '25 (Parks, Volunteers). Parks will source the plants from Pope Farm.

We still need to further discuss other actions, including Bradford pear removal, wider efforts to manage the deer population, bollard replacement along Ridge Road, and interpretative signage.

Mr. Colliton expressed his preference for working with communities like ours that are actively engaged in park maintenance. It's clear also that it helps to let Parks know that these meadows are a heavily used local recreational resource, worthy of their attention.

National Park Service Preservation Briefs

The National Park Service (NPS), which administers the National Register of Historic Places, has produced a series of **Preservation Briefs** to help historic building owners recognize and resolve common problems. They provide information on preserving, rehabilitating, and restoring historic buildings.

The briefs are especially useful to folks who wish to apply for historic preservation tax incentives programs (*such as the Maryland Historical Trust Homeowner Tax Credit*) because they are consistent with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties. The briefs recommend methods and approaches for rehabilitating historic buildings that preserve their historic character.

As an example, [here is a link to NPS Preservation Brief 3 \(PDF\)](#). Across its 16 pages of text, photos, and graphics, it provides a wealth of information for improving energy efficiency in historic buildings. Though specifically written for older buildings, much of its information might be of interest to any homeowner.

Building Permit Submission Deadline

The deadline to submit a building permit application for approval by the Planning Commission and review by the Historic Preservation Commission is **the 2nd Wednesday of the month** prior to the PC meeting at which the permit will be reviewed (this will be in the following month). This timing ensures the HPC will be able to complete a formal review before the PC meeting as this review is required for the PC to approve the permit in a timely fashion. If you are considering any renovation or building project at your house, be sure to get a copy of the procedures to apply for a Town Building Permit which will help you through the Town's process.

Two New Clean Energy Options

New community solar option for Grove residents

[Neighborhood Sun](#) is now offering carbon-free electricity from a new solar farm in Montgomery County that should begin producing electricity in mid-August. Households that subscribe to **Free Rein Solar Farm** can enjoy 10% savings on electricity costs. At least 30% of the solar energy it generates is reserved for low- and moderate-income households at 20% discounts.

Due to poor soil conditions and the site's topography, the land is unsuitable for agriculture but ideal for pollinator-friendly plants. This solar farm meets the county's agrivoltaics standards for solar development. At the end of the panels' 25+ years of operation, the glass and metal components will be recycled, and the land will be returned to its natural state. Several Grove households already receive solar electricity through Neighborhood Sun. Inquire with the Sustainability Committee if you'd like to speak with a Grove subscriber. Also, you can

consult [Utility Advisor](#) for advice about community solar. If you subscribe through them, the Washington Grove Woman's Club will receive a \$25 donation.

MoCo Promotes Capital Area Solar Switch

Could your rooftop be suitable for solar panels?

Explore the possibility and take advantage of the group-buying power of Capital Area Solar Switch as well as Solar United Neighbors' expertise. Solar Switch ensures that participants receive a quality system at a lower price. It screens installers, gets group-price bids from them, and then offers the best-priced solar packages to homeowners. Recently, participating households saved an average of \$4,115 on a typically sized solar installation. You can further reduce costs with state and federal incentives.

Montgomery County's Department of Environmental Protection promotes participation in Solar Switch. **Residents interested in the program should register (free and without obligation) before May 8.** On that day, Solar Switch will hold one of its "reverse auctions" for vetted solar installers. Community Garden Update

With our final delivery to St. Martin's on October 31 last year, Washington Grove's community gardeners donated over 930 pounds of fresh vegetables to local food bank organizations. It was a fantastic first full year, and we hope to do even better this year given our experience learning what works in this location.

We rested in the winter but in March we prepped the beds and put woodchip on the paths. The garlic we planted in November is doing well, along with onions planted in March. Peas and potatoes are leafing out. Seedlings including kale and brassicas are nearly ready to go in, with tomato seedlings and more in the wings. We are always looking for volunteers, so join us if you're interested. No experience is necessary. Regular work parties will soon be scheduled (weather permitting) on Saturday mornings and Tuesday evenings to dovetail with recipient organizations' distribution schedules. Stay tuned!

We are always looking for new members to help protect our East and West Woods Forest Preserves. Please consider attending a Woods Committee meeting to learn about our projects and join us!

Despite the overcast weather, our annual Spring Clean-Up Day celebrating Arbor Day was held on Saturday, April 27th to pick up trash and remove non-native invasive plants in the West Woods. Eleven town volunteers collected 20 trash bags full of garbage, a mattress and box spring, and pulled lots of garlic mustard! We also raked debris from Whetstone Spring to improve water flow.

The Woods Committee also co-sponsored with the 'Sustainability' and 'Forestry and Beautification' committees a talk "*Using local native plants to solve common landscape challenges in Washington Grove*" by Maryland master gardener, Janet Hostetler on April 28th.

A reminder that we have installed trail marker signs in the East and West Woods to help everyone stay on the designated walking trails and protect our understory native plant vegetation. ***Please do not create or cut any new trails in the East and West Woods.*** Please do not walk or bike on the walking trails that are too wet and muddy to avoid rutting and soil erosion, and be careful on the walking trails in the Woods on windy days. There have been several trees which have fallen across the trails during high winds. Please contact Joan Mahaffey or Patty Klein, Woods Committee Co-chairs to report downed trees blocking the walking trails. Please do NOT try to remove or cut back fallen trees on your own without first contacting the Mayor, Town Office, or Woods Committee co-chairs. Your safety comes first!

Also, please contact the Town Office or Woods Committee co-chairs if you see suspicious behavior in the East or West Woods. We want everyone to enjoy the woods and learn about nature in a safe, non-destructive way.
